## Martinez Historical Society

The Martinez Historical Society is managed by a 15 member Board of Directors. The Society operates these facilities:

- The Martinez Museum.
- The Local History Library (published materials).
- The City Archive of historic photographs & other unpublished source documents (unpublished materials).

The Society receives no government funds, but its all-volunteer staff are able to provide these services to the community:

- Permanent Exhibits at the Martinez Museum (located in the Borland House). There is no charge for admission.
- Current exhibits at the Martinez Museum. These exhibits are typically changed several times a year. The new exhibits are kicked off with an Open House for visitors. Currently, there are two simultaneous exhibits:
  - o "Look What We Found" features artifacts donated by various Martinez families over the years.
  - o Doran Lamb's collection of Martinez business signs, street signs, and automotive memorabilia.
- Special tours of the Museum for out-of-town visitors, groups, clubs and VIP's.
- Age-appropriate tours of the Museum for all 3<sup>rd</sup> graders in the Martinez School District.
- Scholarships for high school students who plan to major in history when in college.
- Sponsorship of the Teacher of the Year award issued each year by the Chamber of Commerce.
- Advice to citizens on how to utilize the <u>Museum archives</u> to research their family history, the history of their house, the history of their business, or the history of Martinez.
- Assistance to citizens researching the Museum's collection of thousands of historic photographs.
- An extensive <u>website</u> which receives <u>nearlyh 200 hits/day</u> and which is used as a resource by local schools –
  especially prior to field trips by the children to the Museum, the Cemetery and our historic downtown.
- A guided <u>Downtown Walking Tours</u> of historic Martinez.
- Also a self-guided walking tour brochure -- published by the Society and made available to visitors at the Martinez Tourist Bureau and City Hall. And also at other locations.
- A <u>Martinez Cemetery Walking Tour</u> brochure published by the Society with input from the Cemetery Commission -- for use by the public.
- Lectures or multi-media presentations at the Society's public meetings (minimum 4 meetings / year).
- The Martinez History Lecture Series at the Senior Center. The following are sample lecture topics:
  - "Riding the Rails" by Richard Patchin, accompanied by the band "Joyful Noise"
  - "The Italians of Martinez" by Angelo Costanza
  - o "Celebrate and Commemorate the Martinez Canteen" by Barbara Hannafan
- A monthly brown bag lunch and round table discussion of history for up to 25 people at the Martinez Museum
- Historic markers (bronze plaques) on <u>notable buildings</u> and <u>historic sites</u>. Plaquing is coordinated with over 20 property owners, the City or <u>E. Clampus Vitus</u>, and occurs at an onsite ceremony with the mayor in attendance.
- Publishing projects. Recent books published are as follows:
  - o Images of America: Martinez -- a pictorial history of the City
  - o The Borland Home: a History of the House & Guide to the Museum
  - o Martinez: A Handbook of Houses & History 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition
  - To All Enquiring Friends: Nantucketers in Martinez and San Francisco
- A bi-monthly newsletter. The newsletter publicizes current programs, exhibits and special events. It also features several well-researched and professionally written articles on Martinez history in each issue.
- The <u>Oral History Project</u>. Both video and audio tape are used to capture first-hand accounts of local history by the City's old timers with the help of volunteers from five other groups: Alhambra Creek Restoration & Environmental Educational Collaborative (ACREEC), Alhambra Valley Creek Coalition, Friends of Alhambra Creek (FOACO), Muir Heritage Land Trust and Environmental Studies Academy (ESA).
- Crab Feed -- with prizes designed to raise awareness of local merchants & the Martinez Arts Association.
- Holiday Open House to enable the public to view the Christmas decorations at the Martinez Museum.
- Holiday Frolic. The Museum becomes a "gingerbread house" where young children do crafts and learn history.
- Mini Motorland -- where children operate miniature vehicles, stop at a miniature museum and both see and handle historic artifacts. The event is sponsored by the City of Martinez Recreation Department.
- <u>Historic Home Tour</u>. The tour showcases notable <u>historic homes in Martinez</u> and provides the public with a oncein-a-lifetime opportunity to enjoy the interior of these architectural gems. The <u>John Muir Association</u>, the National Park Services, the Willows Theatre (period costumes), and sponsors such as <u>Shell</u> all assist.
- Research, planning & fund-raising support to the City of Martinez and PRMCC for the Old Train Depot project.
- Survey of Martinez businesses over the last 6 decades. This is a large joint project with Central San.
- A project in process is creating a new display board for the Brown Mausoleum at the Martinez Cemetery.
- An upcoming project is working with City staff to create displays of Martinez history to exhibit at City Hall.
